CITING MAGAZINES AND NEWSPAPERS

Craven, Chris. “Vampires, Vampires, Vampires.” *Vampire Magazine*, vol. 24, no. 1, Jan. 2003, pp. 24-34.

Trost, Kevin. “Creating Something Out of Nothing.” *The New York Times*, 16 July 2008, p. C2.

If the city name does not appear in the newspaper name, place the city of publication in brackets after the name:

Trost, Kevin. “Creating Something Out of Nothing.” *The Star-Ledger [Newark]* 16 July 2008, p. C2.

CITING AN ENTIRE WEBSITE

- Do not include http://
- If you cannot find some of the information, cite what is available.
- If the author is unknown, put the name of the article or the name of the web site in the author position.
- A website whose title is essentially the same as the name of its publisher may omit the publisher name.

- If the publication date is unknown, substitute the publication date with the date the site was accessed.
- DOIs and permalinks, when available, are preferred over URLs.
- For in-text citations, use the first item that appears in the Works Cited entry that corresponds to the citation. Most often, this will be the author or name of the site.

CITING A PAGE OR ARTICLE FROM A WEBSITE

NOTE: Manually split hyperlinks that comprise two lines. Remove the hyperlink (no blue; no underlining).

WORKS CITED PAGE

- Begin your Works Cited page on a separate page at the end of your research paper. It should have the same one-inch margins and last name, page number header as the rest of your paper.
- Label the page Works Cited (do not italicize the words Works Cited or put them in quotation marks) and center the words Works Cited at the top of the page.
- Double space all citations, but do not skip spaces between entries.
- Indent the second and subsequent lines of citations by 0.5 inches to create a hanging indent. (
- All works cited entries end with a period.

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*Note the punctuation at the end of each component!

1. Author.

*use Lastname, Firstname for one author, and for more than one author, include the first one the work gives followed by "et al."
*If the publisher is also the author, do not include an author

2. Title of source.

*use quotation marks for shorter works and italics for longer works as you would elsewhere

3. Title of container,

*the source is the actual work, and the container is the work in which you found it

4. Other contributors,

*this might include "edited by", "translated by", "produced by" or "performance by", *list names as Firstname Lastname

5. Version,

*this includes the volume or edition
*use a numeral and abbreviate vol. or ed.

6. Number,

*this is the issue number
*use numerals and abbreviate no.

7. Publisher,

*give the full name, without words like "Company"
*put a slash / between two joint publishers
*leave out for periodicals and websites (if the same as title)

8. Publication date,

*include month, day and year if possible
*abbreviate months longer than four letters

9. Location.

*either a web address (no http://) or a page number or range
*use p. (single) or pp. (multiple) before page numbers
*for a web address, follow the period with "Accessed on (date)" and a period.
